
### Editorial



#### EBD Produces Publications as Guides for Staff

Four recently produced publications have been distributed to staff. These publications entitled Creating Simple Form Letters Using Mail Merge, Creating a Basic Power Point Presentation, Creating a Simple Spreadsheet, and Safe Computer Use Tips, were prepared to serve as guides for staff. Three of the four give simple instructions to aid in the preparation of basic office generated documents such as form letters, Power Point presentations and spreadsheets. The fourth, Safe Computer Use Tips, was prepared to bring awareness to some of the risks involved in prolonged computer use. It also offers some preventative tips for users.

## The Revision Court Extracted from A Framework for Voter Education, by I. Myrtle Palacio

The Revision Court provides for legal reviews of New Applicants and Current or Continued Electors. The Revision Court is the sole arbiter and authority on who makes the list of Electors as in the case of a New Applicant, or who remains on the list of Electors as on the case of Current or Continued Electors. The legal review is held at each Magistrate's Court in all five District Towns and in the Cities of Belize and Belmopan. The Revision Court is presided over by a Magistrate, and as required by law (ROPA) conducted at the end of each month. The date is administratively set by Registering Officer and/or Chief Elections Officer in conjunction with the Magistrate responsible for the particular District. The Court has until the 5th day of the following month to complete its determination on all matters.

There are 3 (three) periods or types of Revision as required by law (ROPA). In setting the date for Revision, time must be allotted for the entire Objection Process.

① A Monthly Revision is conducted to review all New Applicants on the Supplementary List resulting in a Revised List of Electors.

- ② An Annual Revision takes place in November to review the status of Continued Registration resulting in an Annual Divisional List of Electors. Annual Revision is conducted on or before November 20, after the close of the Objection Period on November 1st.
- ③ February, May, June, July and August are also months when Current or Continued registration is reviewed for the removal of electors who are not qualified to remain on the List of Electors.

#### **Transferring Your Vote**

Transfers from one electoral division to another can only be done during the months of JULY and AUGUST every year. Section 59(1) of the Representation of the People Act states that a registered elector who has changed his place of residence from one electoral division to another and has resided for a minimum period of two months in that new division can give written notice in Form 17 to the Registering Officer of the division in which he now resides.

The Registering Officer requests the voter's identification card or a document with a picture to verify the identity of the applicant. He conducts an investigation and if satisfied, requests the registration documents from the electoral division office. If the particulars on the application are not satisfactory, he shall serve the elector a notice of disallowance stating the reason for such disallowance.

The name is then published in the monthly supplementary list and revised at Revision Court. After Revision Court, the elector's name is struck off from the first electoral division list and added to the list for the new division in which he resides.

An elector cannot be transferred from one electoral division to another after the dissolution of the House of Representatives.

# Recipe Corner Taco Pies



2 (9 inch) deep dish frozen pie crusts, thawed, 1 pound ground beef, 1 (16 ounce) can refried beans, 1 onion, chopped, 1 cup crushed tortilla chips, 1 cup shredded Cheddar cheese, 2 cups shredded lettuce, 1 large tomato, diced, sour cream, black offives


- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Bake pie crusts following package directions, but cutting the bake time in half.
- 2. In a large, heavy skillet over medium-high heat, cook the ground beef until evenly brown; drain excess fat.
- 3. Place half the refried beans in each pie shell, smearing over the bottom and the sides of the partially baked shells. Spread a layer of ground meat over the beans, and top with the onion, crushed tortilla chips, and cheese.
- Bake 15 to 20 minutes, or until the crust is golden brown, and the cheese 4. is bubbly. Top with lettuce, tomato, sour cream, and black olives.

Makes 8 servings
